THE LORD'S PRAYER: "OUR FATHER"

- GIVE US THIS DAY OUR DAILY BREAD

Our series will now focus on the line of this powerful prayer: "Give us this day our daily bread." With these words, we petition God to provide us with everything that we need (rather than want). "Our daily bread" is that which is essential for everyday life. That does not mean simply the food and other goods that keep our physical body alive, but that which nourishes our souls as well. For that reason, the Catholic Church has always seen "our daily bread" as a reference not only to everyday food but to the Bread of Life, the Eucharist—Christ's own Body, present to us in Holy Communion.

We as Christians are reliant upon God for everything in our lives. Not only do we need Him to exist, however, we need the Lord for our daily spiritual sustenance. Prayer enables us to survive. We exist in a very fragile world where life hangs by a thread. Our daily living can be easily disrupted by hardship as we are vulnerable human beings. Each day is a precious gift from God. Through daily prayer, we endeavour to ask God to guide and protect us and our loved ones and help us to live meaningful Christian lives. This dependence upon God and trust in Him helps us to face our challenges with our families, school, work, jobs, finances, retirements, illnesses and

grief. Prayer becomes our loving armour in a difficult world.

"Our daily bread" also refers to praying for the needs of others. We are incredibly fortunate to live such prosperous lives. Others in our city, country and around the world are not so lucky and go to bed hungry. Our prayers and hearts go out to them. We must also reach out to the less fortunate and use our gifts to help in any way we can. In our parish, we work together diligently to remember and help the poor throughout the year with various meaningful projects. In doing so, we are faithfully exercising the "daily bread" part of the "Our Father." We are also called to pray for those who struggle with anger, loss, loneliness, addictions, heartbreak, sinfulness and pain.

Pray wholeheartedly and recall, "Praise the Lord, O my soul; all my inmost being, praise his holy name. Praise the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits - who forgives all your sins and heals all your diseases, who redeems your life from the pit and crowns you with love and compassion...David Psalm 103: 1-5

St. Augustine said: When we say: Give us this day our daily bread, in saying this day we mean "in this world." Here we ask for a sufficiency by specifying the most important part of it; that is, we use the word "bread" to stand for everything. Or else we are asking for the sacrament of the faithful, which is necessary in this world, not to gain temporal happiness but to gain the happiness that is everlasting.

Today, we are so keen on our diet, but neglect what we really need: The Eucharist.
