

Dear Parishioners and Friends of St. Ann Parish:

At this special and sacred time of the year, I wish to extend to you and your loved ones my Christmas greetings and best wishes for the New Year.

I love Christmas! No, not Christmas shopping! The pressure of shopping, the expense of gifts and food, and the expectations of the season can make Christmas an extremely stressful time. If we look around us, Christmas is becoming a mere public holiday. For many, Christmas is celebrated by decorating their homes, setting up Christmas trees, attending plays or concerts and parties, gift giving and visits.

We, my friends, are blessed. We know the truth: That truly Christmas is far deeper than Santa Claus and decorations, Christmas trees and the exchanging of gifts. At Christmas, we celebrate the coming of God's most Precious Gift! "The Word became flesh and lived among us." God humbled Himself to become man – to become one of us – to share His Father's love with us and to show us how to live, to offer us eternal life by paying the price for our sins. This Gift was freely given, and like any gift, it has to be received, but unlike other gifts, there is no coercion to receive it. It is totally up to us if we receive it or not.

In 2010, I was invited to visit a remote village reserved only for lepers in South Vietnam. A young doctor gave us a tour around the village, visiting many different people. Some were seriously damaged by leprosy; some were without ears; others had lost their fingers, their toes ... And as we stopped to visit them, this doctor held their hands, asking them how they were and if they already took their medication for the day. This young doctor had been serving these lepers for a few years. He was married to a young lady whose parents were lepers, and they still live happily in that same village and continue to serve the lepers.

After the tour, a Catholic nun who also served these lepers asked me to visit the Catholic lepers who wished to see a priest. I hesitated for a long moment, but I went. Some wanted their confessions heard; others wanted a blessing ... And again, as we visited them, the Sister held their hands, touching them to express her compassion for them. I could not bring myself to touch them. Instead, I placed my hand on their heads, touching their hair, reassured that I would not be in contact with their skin.

The doctor and the Sister were living examples of the true meaning of Christmas: They humbled themselves to live with the lepers, to serve them and to show God's love for them. And now, throughout the Covid pandemic, there have been many doctors, nurses and volunteers who have given us a glimpse of God's love through their sacrificial service.

Christmas reminds us that Love stepped into the messiness of life through Jesus. That first Christmas, God became one of us. For thirty-three years, He lived among us. He still walks among us, living among us through those who show sacrificial love. He holds the children. He touches the people, the sick, the dying. He eats with sinners. He has compassion for the hungry and feeds them. He is Immanuel: God with us. Our world and we ourselves are in desperate need to discover the real meaning of TRUE UNCONDITIONAL LOVE.


Let our Christmas prayer be for our focus to shift from "the world's definition of Christmas" to one where we open our hearts to desire to receive God's greatest gift: The gift of TRUE LOVE, the gift of Jesus.

May we desire and receive God's love! And with His love, may we recognize Christ in each other, reaching out to those around us, especially those who are difficult to love. For Christ came to earth for all of us! And only Christ, who is LOVE INCARNATE, can transform us into being genuinely loving to others. But Mary and Joseph can show us how to receive Him more fully. And in doing this, we can truly be His hands and His feet, His arms outstretched to the lonely and forgotten.

On behalf of Father Ed and the staff of St. Ann Parish, I wish you and yours a Holy and Happy Christmas! May the Christ Child bless you and keep you safe. I pray that the divine love of the Holy Family serves as an inspiration to us all throughout the year 2023.
