

REFLECTION — FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Be Jesus' collaborators by being healed and healers. Like Job in the first reading, when we suffer, we often lose patience, we worship and blaspheme. When we look at the misery, injustice and sickness all over the world, our reaction is sometimes to rebel against God or to doubt. Like Job, we are invited to turn to God, taking our frustrations to God. This is a decisive step in the healing process.


Today's Gospel takes us into the healing ministry of Jesus. It is a ministry fraught with spiritual struggle, but one that demands a great deal of prayer and perseverance.

When Jesus entered the house of Simon and Andrew, he quickly observed that Simon's mother-in-law was ill with fever. He took her by the hand and got her up. Immediately after her healing, this hospitable woman began to serve the Lord with all her strength and energy.

When we are blocked or paralyzed by sin fever, we are invited to pray with our blockages, putting them before Jesus, asking him to remove or eliminate them. Jesus takes pity on us, because he loves us. He comes to take us by the hand to help us stand up and live in dignity as sons and daughters of God. Jesus wants to heal us of all our spiritual, psychological, mental and physical illness. This ministry of healing is always accompanied by prayer, which is why, the very next day, Jesus takes a step back to pray in all humility.

In the second reading, Saint Paul urges us not just to be passive recipients of the grace of healing and Jesus' love, but also to be active bearers of the good news and healers of those who suffer. In this way, we are invited to be pro-active collaborators in the salvation of mankind, and to say, like Saint Paul, "woe to me if I do not proclaim the Gospel."

On this fifth Sunday of Ordinary Time. Let us ask the Lord to give us faith to benefit from the grace of healing, but also to be bearers of the good news of healing and hope to all the suffering people in the world, especially the poorest and most vulnerable.

- 5. Spend Quality Time with Jesus: Prioritize spending time before the Blessed Sacrament for genuine encounters with the real presence of Jesus Christ.
